


CODE OF FEDERAL REGULATIONS Title 27 Part 4 - Labeling and Advertising of Wine

Any wine listing or inferring an AVA must be made in the state of origin ("fully finished") and meet the requirements of the AVA (Oregon: 95% from the AVA, 90% Pinot Noir)

A valid Appellation of Origin is required

Prohibited Practices

- Mere

Statements on labels. Containers of wine, or any label on such containers, or any individual covering, carton, or other wrapper of such container, or any written, printed, graphic, or other matter accompanying such container to the consumer shall not contain:

- "Any statement that is false or untrue in any particular, or that, irrespective of falsity, directly, or by ambiguity, omission, or inference, or by the addition of irrelevant, scientific or technical matter, tends to create a misleading impression."
- Statements or representations which indicate or infer an origin other than the true place of origin of the wine are prohibited.
- Listings of more than one AVA, and names associated with "special geographical significance".

Joseph Wagner, the founder and winemaker of Meiomi and Elouan Pinot Noir labels and a member of the Caymus Vineyards family, formed this new company in 2014. Baced in St. Helena, Conper Cane has quickly launched multiple labels that include Eluan Willamette Valley Pinot Noir Beran, a line of Sonoma and Napa Zinfandels, Boën Russian River Valley Pinot Noir, Carne Humana, a red blend from the Napa Valley, Steorra Sonoma sparkling wine and as yet unamed Napa Cabernet in development. Wagner's goal is to produce at least 300,000 cases annually.

Meiomi was intended to be a lower-priced Pinot Noir alternative to Belle Gloss. Wagner sourced from vineyards in Sonoma, Monterey and Santa Barbara and the wine was an instant success. The first vintage in 2009 sold 55,000 cases. Selling for about \$20, Meiomi Pinot Noir sales reached 390,000 cases by 2013. Wagner admired the wines of Kosta Browne and produced Meiomi in a similar richly fruited California style, the wine was vinified at a Napa custom-crush facility called the Ranch.

Wagner tried a method called cryo-maceration, freezing the grapes shortly after harvest. During traditional red wine fermentation, heat and alcohol draw out the complex compounds found in grape skins. Cryo-maceration's cold breaks down the grape skin's cellular membranes, allowing the winemaker to draw out the same compounds more gently. The result is softer, rounder wines with deeper color.

In July 2015, Wagner sold the 840,000-case-a-year Meiomi brand to Constellation Brands for \$315 million, a deal that did not include a winery or vineyards. The Meiomi team stayed on as consultants. A year before the Meiomi deal, he launched his own company outside of the Wagner Family of Wines called Copper Cane Wines & Provisions. In April 2016, he moved Belle Glos, a Pinot Noir label started by Chuck Wagner in 2001 and turned over to Joseph Wagner in 2002 to Copper Cane, ending his work with his family. At Belle Glos, Wagner worked with winemaker John Bolta.

Copper Cane has purchased 280 acres in Santa Barbara county, 22 acres in Carneros and several parcels in Calistoga. In all, Wagner owns 458 acres of wines as of 2016.

In Sebastopol, Wagner is trying to develop Dairyman, a cluster of small buildings that once housed a dairy and is surrounded by 40 acres of Pinot Noir that Wagner cultivates. He has proposed building a winery, distillery and visitors center here but local opposition has been strong. Wagner is also looking to build a winery on the property that was once Mare Island Naval Base where the Napa River meets San Pablo Bay in the city of Vallejo.

WHAT THE WINE LABEL TELLS YOU

As consumers become more adventuresome in their wine selections, they look to the label for more information. What makes one wine different from another? What is the dominant grape in the wine? Where were those grapes grown? Although TTB consumer protection regulations only apply to wine of at least seven percent alcohol by volume, this pamphlet contains enough basic information to assist the consumer in making an informed choice when buying wine. This pamphlet discusses wine made from grapes, although wine may also be made from other types of fruit and agricultural products. TTB regulations can be quite detailed in regard to the production of a wine and the information appearing on the bottle; not every possibility is presented here, but this guide will give you a good grasp of the fundamentals. For more detailed information please see the regulations listed on the back of this pamphlet.

VINTAGE DATE

A vintage date on the label indicates the year in which the grapes were harvested. If a vintage date is shown on the label at all, an appellation of origin smaller than a country must also be shown. If an American or imported wine uses a State or county, or the foreign equivalent, as an appellation of origin, 85 percent of the grapes must be from that year; if a viticultural area or the foreign equivalent is used, the percentage is raised to 95 percent.

ESTATE BOTTLED

"Estate Bottled" means that 100 percent of the wine came from grapes grown on land owned or controlled by the winery, which must be located in a viticultural area. The winery must crush and ferment the grapes and finish, age, and bottle the wine in a continuous process on their premises. The winery and the vineyard must be in the same viticultural area.

APPELLATION OF ORIGIN

Appellation of origin is another name for the place in which the dominant grapes used in the wine were grown. It can be the name of a country, State, county or geographic region called a viticultural area, or their foreign equivalents.

A country, State, or county appellation or their foreign equivalent on the label means that at least 75 percent of the wine is produced from grapes grown in the place named.

VITICULTURAL AREA

An American viticultural area is a defined grape-growing region in the U.S: with geographic features (such as soil and climate) that set it apart from the surrounding areas.


A viticultural area appellation on the label indicates that 85 percent or more of the wine was produced from grapes grown in the named area.

ALCOHOL CONTENT

A statement of alcohol content in percent by volume appears on most labels. As an alternative, some bottlers may label wine with an alcohol content from 7 to 14 percent as "Table Wine" or "Light Wine."

DECLARATION OF SULFITES

Required on any wine intended for interstate commerce that contains 10 or more parts per million of sulfur dioxide. Not required for wines only sold in intrastate commerce.

HEALTH WARNING STATEMENT

By law, this statement is required on all alcohol beverages containing 0.5 percent or more alcohol by volume.

BRAND NAME

The brand name is used to identify and market a wine. A brand name may not mislead the consumer about the age, identity, origin, or other characteristics of the wine.

VARIETAL DESIGNATIONS

Varietal designations are the names of the dominant grapes used in the wine. Cabernet Sauvignon, Chardonnay, Zinfandel, and Merlot are examples of grape varieties. A varietal designation on the label requires an appellation of origin and means that at least 75 percent of the grapes used to make the wine are of that variety, and that the entire 75 percent were grown in the labeled appellation (except "Vitis labrusca" grapes, such as Concord, which require at least 51 percent).

OTHER DESIGNATIONS

Wine labels are not required to bear a varietal designation. Other designations may be used to identify the wine, such as Red Wine, Rose Wine, White Wine, Table Wine (if no more than 14% alcohol by volume) or Dessert Wine (if over 14% alcohol by volume).

Some imported wines are designated with a distinctive name which is permissible only on specific wines from a particular place or region within the country of origin, for example, Asti Spumanti from Italy and Bordeaux from France.

COUNTRY OF ORIGIN

Pursuant to regulations issued by U.S. Customs and Border Protection, a Country of Origin statement is required on containers of imported wines. Acceptable statements include "Product of (insert name of country)" or "Produced in (insert name of country)."

NAME AND ADDRESS

The name and address of the bottler or importer must appear on the container. It is also permissible for a bottler/importer to use a duly authorized trade name in place of its usual operating name.

Domestic wines may have this statement further qualified with terms such as "Produced," meaning that not less than 75 percent of the wine was fermented at the stated address, or "Vinted," which means that the wine was subjected to cellar treatment at the stated address.

NET CONTENTS

The net contents of a wine container must be stated in metric units of measure. Wine must be bottled in 50 ml, 100 ml, 187 ml, 375 ml, 500 ml, 750 ml, 1 L, 1.5 L, or 3 L sizes. Containers over 3 L must be bottled in quantities of even liters. No other sizes may be bottled.

2016 VINTAGE

A warm, wet winter across the Willamette Valley brought about early bud break. The warmer weather persisted into spring and encouraged rapid vine growth. A late-July cooling period that continued into September helped to regulate the fruit's sugar development and maintain acidity. Harvest was completed by the end of September and the resulting wines show beautiful color, excellent depth, solid structure and firm acidity.

WINEMAKER NOTES

After harvesting the grapes, we de-stemmed 100% of the clusters. During fermentation, we employ techniques to tailor extraction to the needs of each lot. By catering to the individual needs of each fermentation lot, we can ensure that our style of reactive winemaking is the best way to coax the most ethereal and true qualities from Pinot Noir fruit. We aged the wine for eight months in a mix of new and seasoned French oak and racked it after malolactic fermentation was complete and once more at blending.

TASTING NOTES



SENATE PASSES BIPARTISAN RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING CONTRIBUTIONS OF AMERICAN VITICULTURAL AREAS

Builds upon global industry efforts to promote awareness of and appreciation for protecting all wine region names worldwide

WASHINGTON – The Wine Origins Alliance (WOA) today praised the passage of a bipartisan congressional resolution, S. Res. 649, that recognizes the uniqueness and value of American Viticultural Areas (AVAs). The Senate resolution, introduced by Senators Roy Blunt (R-MO) and Jeff Merkley (D-OR), acknowledges the distinctiveness of American wine regions and the contributions they provide to the U.S. and global economy.

"Missouri has a rich history in winemaking dating back to German settlers in the mid-1800s," said Blunt. "Today, the wine industry contributes more than \$1.7 billion annually to the state's economy. Missouri is also fortunate to have the very first federally-designated American Viticultural Area in the country, which is located in Augusta, Missouri. I am pleased that my colleagues joined Senator Merkley and I in supporting our nation's wines, wineries, and wine-growing regions across the country."

"Oregon wine country is one of the most beautiful and productive regions of our state," said Merkley. "Our delicious pinots, Rieslings and more create jobs and fuel our tourist economy. I am happy to recognize the wine industry's incredible contributions to Oregon and the United States, and will continue to be a strong ally and customer!"

Chapter 845 | Division 10 MANUFACTURERS; WHOLESALERS; IMPORTERS

845-010-0910 | Wine Produced or Bottled in Oregon from Vitis Vinifera or its Hybrid Grades — Purpose and Applicability

(1) The Commission sets rigorous labeling standards for grape wine produced or bottled in Oregon to:

(a) Ensure accurate presentation of the product; and

(b) Encourage Oregon's wine industry by enhancing the quality, image and marketability of Oregon wine.

(2) OAR 845-010-0905 through 845-010-0930 apply to all grape wines produced or bottled in Oregon from vitis vinifera or its hybrid grapes, including restored or unrestored concentrated must of those grapes. They also apply to all grape wines on which "Oregon" or an appellation of origin wholly within Oregon appears as the appellation of origin, regardless of where the wine was produced or bottled. These rules prevail in any conflict between these rules and other rules in chapter 845, division 010.

845-010-0280 | Standards of Identity and Prohibited Practices Concerning Wine

The regulations of the Alcohol and Tobacco Tax and Trade Bureau (TTB) of the United States Department of Treasury apply to all wine sold in Oregon by a Commission licensee. In any case where OAR 845-010-0905 through 845-010-0930 impose requirements beyond those in these federal regulations, or disallow any practice the federal regulations allow, 845-010-0905 through 845-010-0930 prevail.

845-010-0290 | Labeling Requirements for Wine

(1) "Label" means all information-bearing material attached to or a part of a wine container, including all closures.

(2)All wine labels must comply with the requirements of the Commission's advertising rules (OAR chapter 845, division 007), OAR 845-010-0280 (federal standards for wine identity), 845-010-0206(Private Labels) and 845-010-0905 through 845-010-0930 (Oregon standards for wine identity) when applicable, and must be approved by the Alcohol and Tobacco Tax and Trade Bureau (TTB). If a manufacturer or wholesaler sells a wine in Oregon that does not comply with the labeling requirements, the Commission may, in addition to any other sanction, require the licensee to stop selling and recall the wine.

Due to the wild fires that occurred in Southern Oregon and Northern California in the summer and fall period of 2018, Copper Cane LLC. conducted wine analysis from grape samples collected from your Vineyard and that were fermented by the Winery. The objective of the wine analysis was to determine the measurable levels of compounds known to cause 'smoke taint' in fermented wines. According to research conducted by Enartis-Vinquiry and by the Australian Wine Research Institute, the most effective time to test levels of volatile and non-volatile phenolic compounds in grapes that cause 'smoke taint' is as close to the harvest date as possible.

Copper Cane LLC., contracted with the Enartis-Vinquiry Laboratory to analyze the fermented wines from grapes collected from your vineyard for several compounds that have been identified with 'smoke taint' in finished wine. The volatile phenolic compounds identified by Enartis-Vinquiry include the following: Guaiacol and 4-methylguaiacol. Each of these compounds was analyzed for their concentrations in micrograms per Liter (µg/L) by Gas Chromatography and Mass Spectrophotometer (GCMS) to provide the Winery with a measurable indication of the risk for smoke taint in the finished wine from your vineyard. The data for your vineyard as received by the Winery from Enartis-Vinquiry Laboratory has been enclosed for your records. The results for the wines fermented from grapes sampled from your Vineyard are included in the table below.

OLCC Copper Cane Reported Tonnage

Depending upon the percentage of sales scanned vs total sold to all accounts, it is possible Copper Cane experienced approx. 75,000 cases in depletions to accounts and based upon their rate of growth, up to 100,000 cases in shipments to distributors in a 12 month period. In Oregon, Elouan Pinot Noir is currently in stores a vintage behind at 2015.

The 2017 tonnage (using 65 cases per ton) equals 261,715 cases indicating Copper Cane, given their case sales growth rate, is on the way to being seriously over inventoried and needed to cut at least 2,000 tons off the 2018 harvest.

473.045¹

Tax on sale or use of agricultural products used by wineries

(1)A tax is hereby imposed upon the sale or use of all agricultural products used in a winery for making wine.

(2)The amount of the tax shall be \$25 per ton of grapes of the vinifera varieties, whether true or hybrid.

(3)An equivalent tax is imposed upon the sale or use of vinifera or hybrid grape products imported for use in a winery licensed under ORS chapter 471 for making wine. Such tax shall be \$25 per ton of grapes used to produce the imported grape product. The tax shall be determined on the basis of one ton of grapes for each 150 gallons of wine made from such vinifera or hybrid grape products.

(5)In the case of vinifera or hybrid grape products harvested in this state, \$12.50 of such tax shall be levied and assessed against the person selling or providing such grape products to the winery. If the purchasing winery is licensed under ORS chapter 471, that winery shall deduct the tax levied under this subsection from the price paid to the seller. If the purchasing winery is not licensed under ORS chapter 471, the seller shall report all sales on forms provided by the Oregon Liquor Control Commission and pay \$12.50 per ton as a tax directly to the commission.

ORS Chapter 471 Winery Licensees

471.223 Winery license. (1) As used in this section, "control" means that the licensee:

(a) Owns the brand under which the wine or cider is labeled; or

(b) Performs or has the legal right to perform all of the acts common to a brand owner under the terms of a trademark license or similar agreement that for the brand under which the wine or cider is labeled has a term of at least three years.

ORS 471.244¹

Certificates of approval for malt beverages, cider or wine

(1)No licensee of the Oregon Liquor Control Commission shall manufacture, import into, or purchase in the State of Oregon for resale therein any malt beverages, cider or wine unless the manufacturer of such malt beverages, cider or wine has first obtained from the commission a certificate of approval, except that with respect to malt beverages, cider or wine manufactured outside the United States, the certificate of approval may be obtained by the person importing same into the United States. Such certificate of approval shall be granted only to manufacturers or importers who shall have entered into an agreement with the commission to furnish a report to the commission, on or before the 20th day of each month, showing the quantity of malt beverages, cider or wine delivered to each licensee of the commission during the preceding calendar month, and to faithfully comply with all laws of the State of Oregon pertaining to traffic in malt beverages, cider or wine. If any holder of such certificate, or any officer, agent or employee of such holder, shall violate any term or provision of such agreement, or submit any false or fictitious report, the commission may, in its discretion, suspend or revoke such certificate.

471.282 Direct shipper permit; fees. (1) Notwithstanding any other provision of this chapter and except as provided by ORS 471.186 (6), a person may sell and ship malt beverages, wine or cider directly to a resident of Oregon only if the person holds a direct shipper permit. The Oregon Liquor Control Commission shall issue a direct shipper permit only to:

(a) A person that holds a license issued by this state or another state that authorizes the manufacture of malt beverages, wine or cider;

(8)(b) A person holding a direct shipper permit based on a license issued by another state must timely pay to the commission all taxes imposed under ORS chapter 473 on all malt beverages, wine or cider sold and shipped directly to Oregon residents under the permit. The permit holder, not the purchaser, is responsible for the tax.
